THE HEART OF ADVENT

"Advent is dedicated to the last things, to death, judgment, heaven and hell, but above all to Jesus' glorious coming to complete his Easter work. The church goes so far as to set aside an entire liturgical season to the end of the world and the final coming of the Lord, so important a part of the faith does she consider these truths."

With a church season as muddled as Advent sometimes is, it's a good thing to get a crystal clear description of what the season is all about. The four weeks of Advent often are defined by virtues – hope, peace, joy, and love. But even these, depending on your church tradition, may have alternatives, such as hope, faith, joy, and peace. What this suggests is that there are some things that are variable about Advent, and some things that are not.

The thing that is not "negotiable" is the horizon of Advent, which encompasses Christmas, but goes well beyond to the ultimate vision of the Second Coming of Christ. This movement from the present day to the end time is illustrated by the scriptures traditionally selected to define Advent worship services.

The prophet Isaiah is always prominent among these selections. For example, week one of Advent this year features Isaiah 2:1-5, which includes this stirring prophecy: "In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains and...all the nations shall stream to it. ...They shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks..."

And so the Isaian visions continue throughout Advent: "The wolf shall live with the lamb...and a little child shall lead them" (11:6). "And the ransomed of the Lord shall return...they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (35:10).

Not to be outdone, though, is the witness of the New Testament, which in Advent always features the familiar figure of John the Baptist, as in: "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you" (Matthew 11:10). And indeed the Baptist does appear on the scene, early in Matthew, with a message intended for his immediate audience, and for the distant future: "I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me...his winnowing fork is in his hand and he will...gather his wheat into the

granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire" (Matthew 3:11-12).

Matthew's other testimonies in the Advent season reinforce the vital seasonal message: "The virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel ("God with us") (Matthew 1:23). In the course of his life he will proclaim the kingdom of God and be present at its eventual fulfillment; hence, this warning: "Keep awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming...for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour" (Matthew 24:42-44).

In this way Advent covers time, and faith, from beginning to end. Which I've always found beautifully expressed in this closing stanza of "Advent," by Cardinal John Henry Newman:

This then is to watch:
to live in the thought of Christ as he
came once,
and as he will come again;
to desire his second coming,
from our affectionate and grateful
remembrance of his first.

WHAT IS ADVENT ABOUT?

The season of Advent is the first season in the church calendar. It is a time of expectation and hope.
Advent means "arrival" or "coming," and it prompts us to pause each day in December and remember why Jesus came at Christmas. We are all waiting, watching and preparing. As Isaiah (9:6) foretold "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming." Scholars believe that during the fourth and fifth centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the feast of Epiphany. Epiphany is the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1) and his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29). During this season of preparation, Christians

would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration; originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. The "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of the world. It was not until the Middle Ages that the Advent season was explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas. Today, the season of Advent lasts for four Sundays leading up to Christmas.

No matter how we choose to celebrate the season of Advent, let's remember the beauty and grace of Jesus. He entered our dark, broken world on the first Christmas long ago, and He is working even now to restore light, peace, and life. May you and yours find rich blessings in your celebration of this season.

ADVENT WREATHS

The Advent wreath first appeared in Germany in 1839. The wreath is created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Advent candles are nestled in the evergreen wreath. Additional decorations, like holly and berries, are sometimes added. Their red color points ahead to Jesus' sacrifice and death. Pinecones can symbolize the new life that Jesus brings through His resurrection.

The wreath includes four candles. A new candle is lit on each of the four Sundays before Christmas. The first candle symbolizes hope and is called the "Prophet's Candle." The prophets of the Old Testament, especially Isaiah, waited in hope for the Messiah's arrival. The second candle represents faith and is called "Bethlehem's Candle." Micah had foretold that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem, which is also the birthplace of King David. The third candle symbolizes joy and is called the "Shepherd's Candle." To the

shepherd's great joy, the angels announced that Jesus came for humble, unimportant people like them, too. In liturgy, the color rose or pink signifies joy. The fourth candle represents peace and is called the "Angel's Candle." The angels announced that Jesus came to bring peace—He came to bring people close to God and to each other again. The (optional) fifth candle represents light and purity and is called "Christ's candle." It is placed in the middle and is lit on Christmas Day.

Some families enjoy saying prayers and blessings as they light a candle on the wreath each Sunday. Here is an example of an interactive family prayer:

Parent: Lord, you are the light of the world.

Child: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel. Parent: Heavenly Father, we long for your plan of rescue and redemption to be realized. Give us hearts that see Your beauty and wait in hope for You to make all things good and new again.

Child: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel.
Parent: May Your light and love
shine brightly in our hearts,
spreading hope and peace to those
around us.

Child: Amen.

Devotionals for daily prayer and reflection during the four weeks of Advent are available in the Narthex and Church Office. WHAT IS EPIPHANY ABOUT?

Epiphany was introduced into Western Christianity in the 4th century. The name comes from the Greek word *Epiphania*, and means "to show, make known, or reveal". Epiphany is linked in Western churches with the visit of the Magi (wise men/kings) to the Christ child (Matthew 2:1-12). The significance behind the visit of the Magi is the revelation of Christ as Lord and King. The Wise Men were the first Gentiles to recognize the divinity of Jesus, by way of their offerings. The gifts were symbolic of the importance of Jesus' birth, the gold representing his royal standing or kingship on earth; frankincense (an incense or perfume) honoring his divine birth; and myrrh (an oil for treating wounds and embalming) his mortality.

The Bible does not name the Magi or even specify how many came. By tradition, there are three gifts given by three Magi and named Melchior, Kaspar and Balthazar. Epiphany is also known as "Three Kings Day" and "Twelfth Day" because it falls on the twelfth day after Christmas, and signals the conclusion of the Christmas season.

There are many cultural traditions around the world to celebrate. In Hispanic communities, gifts from the Magi are given to children. First Church participated in Three Kings Day events by sending members of our congregation dressed as the Magi to distribute gifts to the students at Buffalo school #36. In many German and Eastern Europe communities, children dressed as the Magi carry a star representing the one followed by the biblical magi and sing Christmas carols as they go door to door. After singing, the children write the three kings' initials on the doorframe in exchange for charitable donations to local food pantries or other charitable organizations.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) does not celebrate Epiphany as a season; we use expressions such as "Fifth Sunday after Epiphany" to indicate the passing of time, rather than a liturgical season or the term "Ordinary Time". For many Christians, the definition of Epiphany is a reminder of God the Father's unlimited love and mercy, which He has extended to all people through the revelation of His Son, and of the hope of salvation for all who come to him in faith

STEWARDSHIP 2020



REFLECTING ON OUR WEEK WITH AN INTERNATIONAL PEACEMAKER

First Church had the pleasure of hosting Rev. Thang Van Lian from Oct 1-6 through the PCUSA's International Peacemaker program. Rev. Thang, native to Myanmar, spoke about peace and reconciliation, particularly around the crisis in his home country. Rev. Thang had a very busy week visiting Presbyterian congregations in Williamsville, Lewiston, Jamestown and right here at First Church! He also taught a class at Houghton College Buffalo.

On Wednesday October 2nd, First Church held a public forum to discuss the humanitarian crisis in Myanmar and the challenges facing Burmese refugees cultural hour with tables of information from local organizations, a henna painter and a food truck. The panel then took place with representatives from community organizations. Joining Rev. Thang were representatives from Journey's End Refugee Services, UB School of Social Work and Burmese Community Services.

On October 6th, World Communion Sunday, First Church held a joint worship with Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church and Westminster Presbyterian Church. Rev. Thang gave a sermon about global peace, harmony and

living in Buffalo. The event started with a goodwill. He spoke about his life in Myanmar, growing up in a rural village experiencing significant challenges, racial and religious discrimination and life threatening situations. We were all inspired by his message of peace and reconciliation.

> Throughout the week Rev. Thang got to see and experience new things in Buffalo, including a tour of Buffalo and Niagara Falls. We thank Rev. Thang for his visit and all of the memories and powerful messages we gathered throughout the week!

BUILDING NEWS

Building updates

There have been numerous upgrades and changes to the building in the last several months that you might not have noticed. Here is a list of current and upcoming projects:

- Panic hardware has been installed on all exit doors including the chapel side door, the three doors in the narthex, and the Wadsworth street door. This will allow for quick exits in the event of an emergency.
- The lanterns in the sanctuary have be updated with LED bulbs and the wiring repaired where needed. I'm in the process of getting parts for the one missing lantern. (Can anyone identify where it's missing?)
- New light fixtures have been installed in the staircase in Allen Hall, including one immediately in front of the doors. (It matches the other three so you probably didn't even notice it!)
- A new freezer has been purchased for the main kitchen downstairs so items belonging to FPC or OSC can be locked up and kept separate from F-BITES supplies.
- ◆ The sprinkler system in the basement had some much-needed repairs to ensure that it remains dependable. These were discovered during our annual test/inspection of the system. NY state is now requiring more extensive tests that should be done every five years. Our contractor will be completing those shortly.
- New soap, toilet tissue, and paper towel dispensers have been installed in all the restrooms. They use less paper and are now consistent throughout the building so ordering supplies is much more efficient.

Tower restoration

You might have noticed that the lifts and scaffolding are gone. Unfortunately, work had to stop because of the cold weather. It will resume again in the spring. However, the good news is that they were able to repoint the entire west face (the one toward the parking lot) which had the most problems. In addition, they "stitched" up the cracks on the north & south faces, installed the lead caps on the sloping area just under the belfry on the west, north, & south sides, and

finished the new copper flooring in the belfry. This makes the tower water-tight. In the spring, they will hang a swing stage out of the belfry to access the east side lead caps and get a close up of the needed repairs on that side. I will be applying for another NY state grant for next year to complete the pointing and continue the investigation to solve the remaining underlying gaps behind the stone face on the west side.



Upcoming projects

- Our electrician will be installing a lantern on the arch in the Wadsworth Street entrance, similar to the one on Pennsylvania. They will also install new photoelectric switches on all the exterior lights that are current operated by timers. (All the lights are now LED so they use less energy).
- The second floor kitchenette is being renovated with a new sink, small dishwasher, new flooring and repainting. This will make it much more useable for our second floor tenants.
- Tentative plans are in place in conjunction with Explore Buffalo to renovate the larger area outside their current offices to make it more useful for them as they continue to expand.
