



COMING MID-SEPTEMBER— A NEW COURSE!

organization aside, there is much more about the Good Book that is hidden from the view of many Christians.

Such as the fact that the Bible did not just spring into being. Its 66 books (by Protestant count) and their origins still are shrouded in mystery. What we do not know about the Bible probably equals what we do know.

We do not know, for instance, who wrote most books, or when they were actually committed to printed form. Things we take for granted, like the order in which we read the Bible – Genesis to Revelation— is largely a human construction, not necessarily the sequence in which these writings were produced.

Perhaps the single most important and

underappreciated fact is that not one of the original manuscripts of any book of the Bible exists, or has yet been discovered. What we have, in various forms, are copies of the biblical texts, some of which were produced probably centuries after they were first written

So this course – The Bible from the Roots Up – is something different. Many Bible studies focus on scripture's fruits, on what is above ground, so to speak. But in the six sessions of the "Roots" course, we are going to explore what is so often unseen, how the Good Book came into being. Rev. Dr. Ken Hughes is your guide for this exciting investigation of the writings we hold sacred.

Watch for a congregational survey on the days and times of the *Roots* course.

We know all we need to know about the Bible, right? For example, the Old Testament has 39 books, period.

...Unless you're Jewish, in which case there are 24 books.

....Or Roman Catholic, in which case there are 46 books.

....Or Eastern Orthodox, in which case there are 51 books.

The varied ways faith traditions organize the Old Testament is one of the much overlooked facts about the Bible. But

Tell us about yourself:



We trust this conversion will result in a vibrant platform for Marykate's work in engaging the congregation and raising our visibility in the community beyond our walls.



ONE WEEK WITH AN INTERNATIONAL PEACEMAKER

This fall there will be an opportunity to meet a leading voice for peace, and to gather as a community with the common goal of promoting harmony and good will. Rev. Thang Van Lian, a minister of the Presbyterian Church of Myanmar, will visit Western New York in early October as one of a number of "international peacemakers" selected by the Presbyterian Church (PCUSA) to witness to the power of non-violence.

Rev. Thang comes with first-hand knowledge of the cause to which he testifies. He grew up in a poor, rural village experiencing significant challenges, racial and religious discrimination, and life-threatening situations. Based on this experience, and his 20 years in ministry, Rev. Thang will speak about the Rohingya crisis, the current civil war on ethnic minority groups, the silence of the Myanmar churches, and what a faithful response might look like to the humanitarian crisis in Myanmar today. He also will share the current peace, justice and development work of the Presbyterian Church of Myanmar.

Week 4 September 22-28: Making Peace by Ending Violence

Week 5 September 29-October 6: Making Peace by Supporting Refugees and Migrants

Clerk's Corner

The following actions were taken by Session at regular meetings in May and June and by the congregation at its meeting in August. There was no July Session meeting.

- ✓ Approved installing the door hardware and exterior lighting as presented by Dr. Bond.
- ✓ Approved the contract with StaffBuffalo according to the terms presented by Rev. Dr. Hughes.
- ✓ Approved the First Presbyterian Church engage a realtor to advise as to the value of 176 College prior to putting the house up for sale.
- ✓ Approved communion for July 7, August 4, and September 8 (Homecoming Sunday).
- ✓ Approved a memorial event for John Burgess on Saturday, June 1 at 3:00 P.M.
- ✓ Approved investigating painting a labyrinth on the floor of the chapel, including pictures and pricing.
- ✓ Dispensed with the reading of the Mission Statement at Session meetings.
- ✓ Agreed to deposit the entire \$100,000 from the Mueller bequest into the Third Century Fund, earmarked the way that the donor requested.
- ✓ Closed out the Perry account and transferred the funds to the Geri Lyon Food Fund.
- ✓ Suspended the requirement for three bids pro tem.
- ✓ Accepted the Supreme Sealing bid for sealing and restriping the parking lot for \$2,615.
- ✓ Accepted the bid from Milio Concrete for replacing the concrete apron and sidewalk from Pennsylvania at a cost of \$8,115 and authorized additional work to repair the sidewalk in poor condition.
- ✓ Approved the resolution authorizing Michael Henry, President of the Corporation, and Mark Armesto, Treasurer, to enter into and execute a project agreement with the State of New York identified as EPF project #168617, and to have authority to sign any related documents.
- ✓ Approved the memorial service for the mother of Cathy Smith of Gateway-Longview on Saturday, June 15 at 11:00 A.M. in the chapel, officiated by Rev. Laura Norris-Buish of our Presbytery.
- ✓ Authorized Dr. Bond to contract with T-Mark Plumbing to dig up the sewer line to solve the drainage issues in the basement for \$8,375, which includes permits, street cuts, and street and sidewalk repair.
- ✓ Approved the memorial service for Jose Gomez and reception at First Church on Saturday, June 22 beginning at 11:00A.M.
- ✓ Approved the request of Rev. Dr. Hughes for First Church to serve as primary host for an international peacemaker during the weekend in which World Sunday is observed (October 4-7).
- ✓ Approved the wedding of Ian Henry and Leah Woodard on Saturday, September 12, 2020.
- ✓ Approved the wedding of nonmembers Samantha James and Michael Barry (member of Bacon Memorial Presbyterian) at First Church on Saturday, August 15, 2020, officiated by the pastor of that church, Rev. Lisa Giacomazza.
- ✓ Approved that First Presbyterian Church will not hold the mortgage for any purchase of the manse.
- ✓ Agreed to take appropriate legal steps to terminate the contract between First Church and the Banses, as long as financing to purchase the manse is not secured before June 21.
- ✓ Agreed to continue to work with Michael Dixon, attorney-at-law, to represent First Presbyterian Church in the sale of the manse.
- ✓ If the way be clear, agreed to enter into a contract with Gurney, Becker and Bourne (Kristan Anderson, Realtor) to sell the manse.
- ✓ If the way be clear, approved the contracted realtor to sell the manse as is for cash.
- ✓ Approved the request for VOICE/Buffalo Immigrant Leadership Team to hold a community celebration at First Church on the evening of August 17.
- ✓ Elected Mark Armesto to serve as Clerk of Session pro tem, beginning in August.
- ✓ Approved the baptism of June Frances Gardner on Sunday, July 14.
- ✓ Approved a Session recess in July.
- ✓ Approved the pastor's study leave from June 30 to July 7.
- ✓ Approved that 40% of the Pentecost offering be donated to Gay & Lesbian Youth Service (GLYS).
- ✓ Agreed to partner with One Symphony Circle and Allentown Association and take part in National Night Out on August 6.
