

## **Bird Songs**

Many of you know that I visited my family at our place in Montana several weeks ago. My brother, Alan, is a retired professor from the University of Nebraska Lincoln, where he did extensive animal behavior research on pinyon jays. He has a continued interest in anything avian, and as our property is basically a bird sanctuary, he got a wonderful app on his phone called Merlin (it's free). It could identify a bird simply by its call, so I got it on my phone when I got back to Buffalo. Hearing a bird call I didn't recognize, I quickly got out the phone, but by that time there was silence — no chirping. Nothing. Oh well! Next time.

I thought about that after Stan's Sunday sermon in which he quoted Jesus' comments to his disciples after they were not welcomed in a Samarian village. They went on to the next village instead. (In my case, the next bird song!) Stan related this to the work of the Network of Religious Communities in trying to bring people of all faiths together to work on common areas of concern. Sometimes they're willing to dialogue, sometimes not, and sometimes even refuse the invitation. So, it's on to the next village so to speak – to keep trying the dialogue and offering it to anyone. His point was that our willingness to dialogue respectfully with each other is what we need to do to keep democracy alive in this country whether it's about abortion rights, gun control, election fraud, or dissatisfaction with our elected officials. How each of us does that is up to us.

So it is with First Church. The transition team has done a terrific job in laying the groundwork for our next direction, whatever that will be. Session members have stayed in touch with the congregation to dialogue with everyone, so that everyone gets heard.

In some sense, Session functions as your elected officials. If you haven't been contacted yet, reach out to me and I will be sure to get someone to call you. The need for dialogue is always there and your opinions are welcome. We are moving into new territory and need your input.

Hmm ... I think I hear another bird call!!

## Message from Kurt Froese, Family Ministries Director


Christian Education

We have reasons to celebrate and to which to look forward in terms of Christian Education at First Church.




We will need more household goods since the family is larger than originally planned for. If you'd like to help out, please check this link to see what is still needed.

#### Joan's Festive Salad

#### Salad ingredients:

Romaine lettuce 1 pear, chopped 3/4 c. dried cranberries 1 apple, chopped 3/4 c. shredded Swiss cheese 1/2 c. cashews

Dressing ingredients::

1/2 cup sugar 1/3 c. cider vinegar

2 tbsp lemon juice 1/2 tsp salt

Put in blender and blend. Add 2/3 cup vegetable oil and blend well. Toss. Serves 10.

#### Ilsa's Version of Shoney's Strawberry Pie

I1 cooked pie shell

1 qt. fresh strawberries\*

1 c. water

Red food coloring

1 c. sugar

6 tbsps. cornstarch

4 tbsps. strawberry-flavor Jell-O

Whipped cream (homemade or store-bought)

Cook together water, sugar & cornstarch until thick & clear. Add to Jell-O to the mixture and then cool. Next add food coloring. Mix in strawberries.

Lightly pour completed mixture into pie shell.

\*NOTE: If using frozen strawberries, use 1 c. juice, instead of water and 3/4 c. sugar, instead of 1 c.


In other news of the family, **Judith Paradzai's** mother died in Zimbabwe, after an illness of a couple of years. She was laid to rest in Buluwayo.

## **GARDEN WALK 2022**



## A Reflection: Wisdom Rules

We love a warm destination with sunny beach and breezy cruises on lake or sea. Apostle Paul once boarded a ship bound from Caesarea to Rome. The sail involved the beautiful Mediterranean. But the sea held unhappy surprises. And Rome was not to be a vacation spot. Paul and fellow prisoners were being herded from one jail to another. At a port in Lycea, they transferred to a second ship. After only a few hundred miles, bad weather impelled the crew to put into port on the Greek island of Crete. They were still over 1000 miles from Rome.

Ideally, a ship could cover up to 100 miles a day. As such, their passage would've taken about 2 weeks. But Paul forewarned Julius, centurion in charge of soldiers and prisoners. Paul observed that the already dangerous voyage could turn out disastrously. Wise advice. Yet Julius heeded the navigator, who happened to own the ship. Time was money. So the man at the helm commanded caution to bow to foolish risk. Then arose a raging storm. Zero visibility prevailed. Paul reminded the crew how reckless it was to sail in unruly conditions. Through the Holy Spirit, Paul predicted the ship soon would be destroyed but no man would perish.

After 2 weeks of wild weather, the sailors lost faith in Paul. They desperately lowered a lifeboat for themselves. But Paul commanded them to stay aboard or else perish. This time they listened. Just like it is for us, wise decision-making was a work in progress for them.

Paul then broke bread and gave thanks, as was the custom of his Captain, Christ Jesus. Enough was multiplied to satisfy all 276 men. God's favor is evident within this miracle.


Next day, amid pounding surf near a beach where the crew tried to guide the ship, it struck a reef and broke apart. The soldiers rashly planned to kill the prisoners. This, to prevent escape, as if wisdom dictated any doable means. To spare Paul's life, the centurion intervened. Julius ordered swimmers to jump overboard first and the rest to float ashore on ship fragments. As promised, all safely landed on the subtropical island of Malta.

It was ironic that a deadly poisonous snake then landed on Paul's arm. The islanders presumed Paul was about to meet a just fate for crimes they imagined he'd committed. Since The Lord had previously ordered Paul to preach the gospel in Rome, he knew the serpent couldn't harm him. He casually flipped it off into a fire. The same crowd who, seconds earlier, had deemed Paul a murderer, now idolized him. Not surprising. Wavering human nature tries to make sense of confusing events by drawing its own conclusions. Even flipping switches in the process. It's why we must navigate our minds with God's wisdom as our compass. Now if any of you lacks wisdom, he should ask God, Who gives generously to all, without finding fault, and wisdom will be given to him. But he must ask in faith, without doubting, because he who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. - James 1:5-6.

After 3 months, all boarded a third ship. After past delays of many months, the final stage likely lasted many additional weeks. We pause to recall that Rome was not a holiday destination for Paul. And we stop to seriously consider this: no matter how comfortable our circumstances may be, this flawed earth is not our staycation spot. Besides, each of us is currently in one of 4 phases: (1) navigating rough waters of problems; (2) emerging from rough waters, (3) enjoying a respite, or (4) heading back into rough waters.

Our summer experiences likely will be pleasant ones. But we've all had upsetting encounters on the sea of life. And by the way the world is heading, Christ followers should know that pleasures we take for granted are quickly fading. Time is marching towards the great tribulation, as predicted in multiple Bible books. Our emotional journeys well may take stormy turns. Covid's travails will seem like a mere preview. And just as it's been throughout history, there are in present power many wayward captains. Like the owner of the second ship, they risk our well-being for money and self-glory. Their personal shipwrecks will turn out direly if they don't repent (turn away) from sinful habits. This is equally true of all people who continually cling to forbidden lifestyles. Putting oneself in charge of one's life, instead of trusting The Lord to lead, will lead to eternal regret. We should be preparing for The Lord's return (1 Thess. 5:2). If He comes during our lifetime, you'll be in a good place if you live for Him. Don't risk being left behind to face antichrist murdering the belatedly contrite or God pouring wrath on the stubbornly unrepentant.

We can't fully understand God. His ways and thoughts are higher. Despite our prideful nature, we know He's truthful. And He's Truth itself. So it's vital to plug into the Bible for His wisdom. It imparts spiritual visibility. It's the perfect compass for rough spiritual seas ahead. The big picture will unfold as God has foretold.



## A Parting Inspirational Spiritual Moment

I have struggled in my life with some narratives in the Bible. One with which I have had to come to terms is the account of Jesus turning over tables in the temple (**Matthew 21:12-13**). I have always understood Christ to be a peacemaking, nonviolent Savior. After all, we see our Savior instruct Peter to put his sword away.

What happened on the cross has allowed my greatest understanding about who I believe God to be. As we work through our upcoming class on the prophet Jeremiah, we will be struck by how, at times, things need to be torn down to be rebuilt.



The prophet Jeremiah's very call was to uproot and tear down, to destroy and overthrow... This seems to me to be antithetical to who Christ is. But Jeremiah's call does not end there, it ends with the words to *build and to plant* (Jeremiah 1:10).



Even on the cross, Jesus' death was concurrent with a holy foundation — the temple of God, and its curtain being torn from top to bottom (Matthew 27:51). Sometimes, in order to be able to build and plant, tearing down may need to happen. Difficult conversations may need to occur; confessions may need to take place. And outrage against injustice may lead to turning over tables. Particularly the tables of injustice we find in our churches.

What needs to happen in our own lives to be able to build and plant? It may take digging into the land of our lives and uprooting. This work is difficult. But it is our call as the church to do Christ's work of cultivating land that seems desolate, so that it will bring hope to hopeless situations (Ezekiel 36:34)
